## MCAS SUCCESS

2013 MCAS results are In! The Mass. Dept. of Elementary and Secondary Education released the final 2013 MCAS results last week with some good news for our school and district. The Grade 9 and 10 MCAS are a summative assessment of how our entire district performs. This success is a result of the professionalism of all of these students' teachers K-12.

In English Language Arts, **99% of our students reached the Proficient or Advanced standard**, which is 8% higher than the state average and up from 93% last year. Oakmont's Advanced and Proficient percentage has increased 9% since 2009. Perhaps more importantly, 57% of our students scored at the Advanced level, 12% higher than the state average and a 2% increase from last year's results. Our ELA results place our students in the top 10% statewide.

Eighty-nine percent of our students scored Advanced or Proficient in Math, the state average is 80%. Our Math scores are in top third in the state.

In Science and Technology, 86% of our students scored at the Advanced or Proficient level, which ranks in the top 25% in the state. It also tops the state average by 15%. Since 2009 the number of Oakmont students scoring at Advanced and Proficient has improved by 13%.

We're extremely pleased with this year's MCAS scores which confirm a few important realities about our school. The results show that our students work hard, take their studies seriously, and achieve at high levels when compared to their peers statewide. They show that our district's elementary, middle and high school teachers are skilled, dedicated, and effective. Finally these scores show that our parents and communities are supportive and place a high value on the education of our young adults.

We congratulate the student and parents of the Class of 2015 for their MCAS achievement, but all of us in the Oakmont family have a lot of which to be proud.

### TEACHERS KEEP BUSY!

The notion that teachers have the summer off is inaccurate in our school district. This summer Oakmont teachers participated in a number of professional development workshops, conferences and graduate courses: AP Biology Certification, Harvard Forrest Pilot Program, Mass. Assoc. for Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance Clinic, Bigger Faster Stronger Certification, Modern Arabic Fiction, Playwriting, The Arabian Nights and the Art of Story Telling, Scholarly Writing in the Humanities, Teaching Technology, Discipline with Dignity, Teaching Climate Change through the Media, NEEDS Energy Course, Standards for Math Practice, Managing and Changing Difficult Behavior, Non-fiction in the Classroom, Issues in Professional Practice, Cultural Competency in Counseling, LGBT Training, Strategies in Facilitating Cooperative Learning, Chinese Culture Content in STEM, Fiction of Relationship, MAST Conference, Curriculum Mapping, and BioEthics Course. Two of our teachers were presenters at professional conferences: Business Education teacher, Wendy LeBlanc presented at the national Financial Literacy and Economic Education Conference and our Librarian, Jeff Aubuchon presented at the NH School Library Association Conference. Mr. Aubuchon also published an article in Knowledge Quest Magazine entitled "21<sup>st</sup> Century Thinking at the Local Level." Dr. Hart annually corrects AP History exams for the College Board.

As a district, all of our teachers devote a vast number of hours to further their professional practice. The AWTA polled its members: 81 k-12 teachers responded.

- 3,862 hours of PD workshops, grad courses, Common Core alignment, creating new curriculum
- 880 hours packing, unpacking, cleaning, setting up classrooms
- 225 hours on curriculum mapping
- 480 hours teaching summer school

We are fortunate to have this group of professionals serving our children and community.

## Summer Reading Day



We celebrated our ONE SCHOOL, ONE BOOK summer reading initiative on Thursday, September 19, 2013- "Talk Like a Pirate Day." Students and staff read Robert Louis Stevenson's classic, *Treasure Island* this summer. A day of adventure was planned for students that included treasure hunting, code deciphering, map making and costumes.

Many students dressed like a character from the book or a pirate. After taking a short quiz on the reading. (Two-thirds of our students scored 60% or better on the quiz, of all Oakmont students, 38% scored 80% or above on the quiz, earning coveted bonus points.) Two Students from each homeroom were chosen as treasure hunters, the criteria were that they needed to be in costume, passed the quiz and had a signed parent permission slip. They then started the hunt with the help of their classmates. As they followed the treasure map, they encountered clues embedded in QR Codes. They texted or emailed the code back to their homeroom where the students scanned the code revealing a clue in the form of a question related to the book. Each of the school's eleven departments submitted four questions that connected their content area to a theme of *Treasure Island*. Different questions were designed for Seniors, Juniors, Sophomores and Freshmen. The answer was sent back to the treasure hunters and they received the directions to their next clue location. The first homerooms from each grade to successfully complete the map receive their "treasure." (Winning homerooms listed on the next page.)

Students in their homerooms were also very active. They tracked the path of their hunters, scanned QR Codes, researched answers to the clue questions, created murals and played a call-in Treasure Island trivia contest. The event was filmed and broadcast by AWCATV. The day concluded with a school wide closing ceremony in our new gym, at that time prizes were given for the treasure hunt, trivia contest, and best costumes.

The ONE SCHOOL, ONE BOOK Summer Reading Program is an important part of a student's experience at Oakmont Regional High School. The day's activities were designed to promote a love of reading and a sense of community. The activities added an element of fun and adventure that reinforced the importance of reading. It included creativity, problem-solving, and the use of technology that engaged nearly all of our 680 students, and showcased the commitment to excellence the school, community and parents have for our students. It was an embodiment of our Core Values: Communication, Self-Direction, Problem Solving, Responsibility, and Respect.
